He graduated in 1964 from McLane High School in Fresno. He served in the Army for 2 years and was stationed at Fort Hood. Texas.

After leaving the military, Paul went into the field of Architecture, became a licensed architect in 1988, and just recently retired after 41 years.

He has been involved in art throughout his life but now being retired, hopes to dedicate more time to explore the creation of art.

He has received several honor awards for his art.

- Channel 18 Public Television Award -Paul's painting was selected to be the "poster" for the year that is sold to raise money for the network.
- Paul's work has also been chosen to be a "gift" for a visiting Chamber of Commerce Member for the Sister City of Fresno in Kochi, Japan.
- He has had several one-man exhibitions at Fresno City Hall, Fresno Convention Center and art galleries in the Fresno area.
- He has received many ribbons in art showings from the Fresno Fair, at a local shopping mall and peer art competitions along with the local Art Hop every month for several years.

7 HARD QUESTIONS FOR EVERY ARTIST

Excerpts from a free ebook by Joey O'Conner The Grove Center for the Arts & Media

I believe there are seven hard questions every artist must answer if they are really serious about their craft.

Question 1: How Serious are you about your craft?

People have said you have talent, but how serious are you about your craft? The name "artist" is easily thrown around by people who dabble, but who don't take their craft seriously.

"Good enough" is not good enough. Artists who are serious about their craft will do whatever's necessary to take their work to the next level. Serious artists go the extra mile, take the next class, get the next critique, find a mentor or pay whatever money is necessary to improve their craft.

2. Do you possess the necessary character qualities to become a strong artist?

Notice, I did not say "famous" or "rich" artist. A strong artist is always looking to improve the quality of their art. Is it any wonder, for artists with this mindset, that the quality of their work improves over time? Persistence. Patience. Delayed gratification. Industriousness. Self-discipline. Humility. To excel at your craft, you need a strong heart, mind and character to go the distance.

There is no substitute for character. And character is always revealed through action.

3. Can you receive constructive criticism that would make others wither?

There are two types of criticism:
Constructive criticism and negative
criticism. Nobody likes negative criticism. A
good critic, say teacher, mentor or
professor, is always interested in
developing the artist.

We will always learn more from solid constructive criticism than the praise and adulation our easy-street ego craves.

4. Is your work fresh and original?

A true mark that an artist is serious about their craft is fresh and original work. Now, that said, we all have artists who have influenced us just as all those artists had other artists who influenced them as well.

Any art form is a derivative of other art forms.

What you want to reach for is your "fresh and original voice." Art that is uniquely you because you created it.

There is a place for experimenting, copying, learning and performing, but whatever artistic discipline you practice, seek to find your own creative voice.

5. Do you have a supportive community?

To be an artist for the long haul, you need a community who both challenges and pushes you in your work. You don't necessarily need to have an artistic community. You simply need friends or family who can bring more depth, meaning and perspective to your life.

You don't need a large community. You need a supportive community of people who can both engage with your art and you with theirs. And you need a community of people who help you disengage from your art so your identity does not become solely wrapped up in your work.

It is easy for some artists to become isolationist.

6. Do you have a life apart from your art?

If your ego and identity are so tied to your work that your artwork is all you talk about, then you're in danger of becoming a one-note artist. You might need a few more notes to created some melody and harmony in your life. Take up something new. You won't be lacking new ideas and perspectives. You'll also become a much more interesting person.

7. Do you give back?

Are you generous? Do you help and serve others without expectation of repayment? Do you help and assist others as others have helped you along the way? Do you offer encouragement to other artists just like the day you needed some encouragement?

Giving back is a good sign of a full heart that is grateful for the privilege of being an artist.
